

GETTING STARTED - Slide the Road Rally U.S.A. diskett into your computer's disk drive. Close the drive door. Then turn on the computer. After a brief title sequence sand introduction screen, you'll be asked if you want to game to have sound. Press Y for YES or N for NO. Then your ready to go. Any time during play sound can be turned off by pressing the "S" key on the keyboard. To turn sound back on. press "S" again) READY TO RALLY - Get ready. Get set. And you're off on a romping road race across Your goal - to reach all your target sites before time runs out. Use your maps and clue cards to pinpoint the sites, then navigate the highways to your goal. CHOOSE A REGION - First, decide where you want to play. The U.S. has been divided into seven geographic regions, with an average of 24 targets sites per region: New England, Middle Atlantic, Southeast, South Central, Northwest, and North Central. Press SPACE BAR to see the different regions, Press RETURN to choose the region you'd like. CHOOSE A LEVEL - Next, choose your level. There are three game levels which differ in the number of targets sites, the types of clues you will get, and the number of obstacles you'll face SUNDAY DRIVER: 3 target sites, site names are given, few obstacles Casual Curiser: 3 target sites, clues describe site, more obstacles HIGHWAY HOT SHOT: 5 target sites, clues describe sites most obstacle Press SPACE BAR to move the flag to a level name. Press RETURN to choose your level. CHECK OUT THE SCREEN - As you play, you'll see two of maps on the screen:

A region map shows the entire region you've chosen, with all sites marked, but not named. A flashing cursor shows your car's position. At any time during play you can review this map to get your bearing by pressing R. Section maps are where you do your driving. They show close-ups of small areas of a region. There are about 20 sections in each region. Drive from section to section by following a road off the edge of the screen. START YOUR ENGINE -At the begining of the map of your region and the name of your starting location will appear on the screen. Your location will \be marked on the map by 'a flashing cursor. Remeber that position! Then press RETURN. The screen will change to a close-up map with your car at its starting place, and your first clue will appear. If you've chosen the SUNDAY DRIVER LEVEL, the clue will name your first target site. (A site can be a city, a national monument, or a geographic landmark.) If you've chosen a higher level, your clue will tell you about the site. You'll have to discover the site name. MAKE FOR THE MAP CARD - Before you start driving your best is to pull out the map card for your region. (If you're not sure of your target site, the information on the front map and the facts on the facts on the back will help you to figure out what it is.) If you know your site, use the map to find your target and starting point. Plan the best route between the two, and you're ready to go! DASHBOARD DYNAMICS - Next direct your attention to the dashboard on the right of the screen. The gauges will give you important information about your status as you play. SECTION LOCATOR - A movable box on the region map shows the location of the section map in which you are currently driving. GAS GAUGE- Strip on gauge shrinks to show how much gas you have left. ROAD INDICATOR - Shows current highway location.

Shows how much time you have left (each game is 12 mintues long) SITE MARKERS - Light up to show number of sites visited. RADIO-Flashes to warn of some obstacles. CAR COUNTER- Show how many cars you have (you start with a total of four cars) -cars are lost by hitting obstacles and running out of gas) SCORE-Keeps a running point total (score depends on time used, bonuses, number of wrong site guesses, and cars remaining) SPIN YOUR WHEELS - Now, look back at the close-up screen, find your car, and take the wheel. The name of the road you are on will appear on the dashboard. Compare it with your route plan. Then step on the gas and head for your first target site. Use J. K. M. & I To steer your car. Press SPACE BAR to stop. Are you on the right track? To be sure, check the names of sites (-) along the way by pressing SPACE BAR to stop next to them. This will help you find your way, and also get to know the region. WATCH OUT - By the way, we ought to warn you about obstacles you'll face as you motor across the miles-things like falling trees, landslides, and other nasties that you'll have to discover. If you get zapped by an obstacle, you lose a car. So keep your eyes open for these car crashers. if you see one threatening, stop (by pressing SPACE BAR) or change your course-fast! Two other things you'll want to watch for, but not to avoid, are bonus people asnd gas stations .Bonus people are the flag wavers by the side of the road. Stop your car next to one to get extra points. As for gas stations, stop your car next to one of these to fill your tank. Run out of gas sand lose a car-it's that simple! So keep an eye on your gas gauge! ON SITE - Finally, you've driven the roads, avoided obstacles, and reached your goal. Stop at the site, press SPACE BAR and the site name will appear on the screen. Press RETURN to make your guess, if you've guessed the right site maker will flash on your dashboard. Waste no time, press RETURN again to get your next clue, and you're off to a new site. Find all of your target sites before time runs out, and you win. So, off you go! Take the challenge and be a Road Rally driving ace!



HOW TO USE THE MAP CARDS

These handy dandy map cards will help you figure out the names and locations of your target sites, and plan routes to get from one location to another. There are eight cards in all, one for each region of the U.S., and one that shows the entire country (except Alaska and Hawaii).


The front of each region card shows a detailed map of the region, with the same sites, roads, and states as on the screen region map. (The roads on the two may look a little different because one is a computer graphic, and the other an illustration.) The big difference is that on the map card every location is clearly labeled for you.

On the maps you'll see squares and stars. Note the legend that keys your sites. The roads have markers right on them. The marker (with the dark top) is for U.S. interstate highways. On your dashboard and in your clues interstates are noted with "I". The even-numbered interstate highways (e.g., I-10, I-20, I-30) run east/west. The odd-numbered ones run north/south.

The marker (with no dark top) is for state highways, which are noted in your clues and on your dashboard as "Rt" for "route". The other abbreviations in your clues are for directions: northeast (NE), northwest (NW), southeast (SE), and southwest (SW). Scale indications are approximate, since locations are spaced to more accurately reflect the software.

Flip each region card over and you'll find lots of facts about sites in the region—names of state capitals, geographic statistics, and other interesting tidbits.

By using information from the map and the fact section you will be able to interpret each region clue given during your game. You can check route connections, site locations, city size, geographic relationships, etc. Once you've pinpointed your sites, you can use the map to find the names of the highways needed to reach your target. Make your driving plan and you're on your way!
