USERS GROUP MEETING- SEPTEMBER 13th 1978

- 1. Meeting was attended by 11 people, 4 of whom were at previous meeting.
- 2. Users still waiting for back-ordered Apple disks 20 currently backordered.
- 3. R. Wentworth reported that EDN of Nov 77 has article on interfacing to Apple. 4. It was suggested that future newsletters of comparable size to Aug issue
- be reduced (the type and mage that is) to save printing cost
- 5. A p oll was taken on interest of users in a special BASIC programming class. Since only one user expressed interest, matter was dropped.
- 6. It was suggested that the newsletter publish critique on performance of currently available business software packages. Anyone purchasing a new package should make known the advantages and disadvantages of such software to the newsletter editor so that other Apple users may benefit from that users expertence and be able to make the most effective evaluation of that software before p urchasing it.
- 7. Per suggestion of Computerland and approval by users, subsequent user group meetings will be split into two equal length sessions- a business session to discuss matters relating to business software and hardware, and a hobby session.
- 8. Computerland reported that a contract group had volunteered to write business software at approximately half the going rate in exchange for rights to that software.
- 9. R.Wentworth reported that he had developed a system package which would display upper case, lower case and italic characters in HIRES mode within the HIRES area. This package is for sale.
- 10.Apple informed Computerland that they will not honour warrantee if non Apple memory is installed.
- 11.Computerland showed some new books. The 'Programming Proverbs' is recommended.

INVERSE & FLASH in INTEGER BASIC:

On page 30 of the Apple II ref.manual there is ref. to how to set Inverse and Flash using location 50. The information is both incorrect and incomplete. There are 4 numbers which one would normally wish to POKE into location 50. These are with their corresponding function:-

POKE 50,63 Set INVERSE for all characters being printed POKE 50,127 Flash letters; Inverse numbers and special characters. POKE 50,191 Print numbers & special characters in normal mode- don't print letters at all.

POKE 50,255 Normal mode

Flashing of numbers and special characters is difficult in integer Bascic as it requires the setting of the high order ASCEI bit in each character. If you want to flash numbers use Applesoft II !
