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

THE DEATH OF AN APPLE TREE BRANCH

It was about three years ago that the St. Paul/Mahtomedi branch of Mini'app'les was formed. At the time there was a small well informed group of persons who were very "into" these small computers. These were the "insiders". A small segment of the normal populace was just beginning to awaken to the existance of these new wonder machines. The dealers who were selling the microcomputers normally were no help in the answering of questions from these "outsiders". The dealer would either babble in techno-speak or knew little more than how to unpack the shipping carton. There were precious few publications on the market and to even get a look at most of them one had to go to the right place or send for a subscription. Where was the new interested user to turn?

This was the genesis of our branch. Meeting in White Bear Lake, and later in Mahtomedi, we were blessed with large groups of users at all levels of sophistication who wanted to be able to better understand this wonder machine that was holding them captive. G oll-ly, another month has slipped past and it's new software time again! In addition to the 'recycling' of some EAMON text adventure disks, we're adding 7 new adventures to the list (see end of article re: EAMON Names and Numbers). Three disks (2 IAC and 1 Personal Domain) crossed the tape just as newsletter deadline approached (aka NDA). This dreaded disease almost caught up with me this month. Two of the disks I'd planned on using turned out to be real turkeys (in their present form), but when they're revived and up to full performance, boy, will my job be easy that month... hmmm... can see it now.... Anyhooo, I'll hold onto the turkeys for a while and let you savor the delights below (Al Sicherman, eat your heart out!):

IAC #28 Pinball Games (DOS format)

Pinball Games. Really now, what needs to be said? There are 4 (count 'em 4!!) great pinball games on this disk. As the startup screen indicates, these FAST ACTION games were created using Pinball Construction Set by Bill Budge. Primary input for the games is through the 'buttons' of a joystick, paddles, Koala Pad, or, if you have a //e, the Open/Closed Apple keys! It helps to use a paddle or joystick type of input device, because, the amount of pull on the plunger may be varied with these devices. If you use the O-A and C-A keys, the plunger is always pulled all the way out.

...Pardon the delay, I had to go and play each of them several times just to be sure of my facts (I conveniently lost my notes so I just HAD to spend the last 2 hr. 50 min. checking these out!) The four games are titled: The Maxx Machine, Flip It, Maxx's Madness, and Super Blast. Though I have yet to 'tilt' the machine, here are my explanations/impressions of each of the 4 games:

The Maxx Machine: All of the pop bumpers (aka jet bumpers) are invisible until they're hit! Therefore, luck is a major factor. Fast-action flippers are your only means of keeping the ball from draining. The tilt of the play surface makes the ball react very realistically to gravity.

Flip It: Play is on 2 'levels' with a pair of flippers guarding the drain on each. Spinners/roll-overs too. All bumpers are visible in this and the remaining 2 games.

Maxx's Madness: The play surface is on 3 levels with a total of 8 flippers at your disposal (drain?). Spinners and chutes too. The flippers have an "old game" feel because they are slower to react to your pushing them. Therefore, you'd better plan your moves slightly in advance of the action you desire.

Super Blast: 3 levels, 5 flippers, 2 chutes, spinners. One of the chutes catches your ball and holds it. At that time, a new ball is readied for play. When 3 balls

have been 'captured', they're all let loose at once! THAT'S ARCADE ACTION!!

Features common to all games: Up to four players can play (use space bar to select number of players before starting a game). Games are started by pressing one of the flippers. 5 balls per player. Bonus points awarded. All are playable on a monochrome monitor, but for best results, use color.

IAC #35 Build a Program (DOS format)

Build a Program. As stated in the program's documentation, this disk will create the shell of a program you then use as the basis of a program you're writing. The shell it creates will contain standard pre-coded variables, a date routine, standard coding for clearing the screen, positioning the cursor, and centering displays. Also included are routines which will aid in 'inputting' information from the user of your program such as showing the length and then checking for maximum allowable length.

When using the date input routine, a user will enter today's date in the format of MM-DD-YR and you will be given (automatically) the following additional information: day-of-week, Julian-day-of-year, and whether it's a leap year or not!

These routines will also generate the coding needed to build and maintain an indexed sequential file. An indexed sequential file is one that can be accessed either randomly or sequentially. Each record of the file always contains 2 fields that are generated by the system: Record status and Records key. The remaining fields are user defined and restricted to 25 fields in total. The routines will let you create, read, write, re-write, delete, read-next and maintain the files. Any coding needed to access the records is totally up to you.

Whenever you have a shell program created for you in Applesoft, you must be sure not to re-use the variables accessed by the shell routines. The primary restriction in this case is to avoid the use of Y or Z as the prefix to any data names. Also, do not renumber the I/O portion of the program.

The best way to learn this system is to look at the coding in the file 'Inventory-demo' and then give it a try. On-disk documentation provides more details.

Hi-Res Doodle (Personal Domain)

Hi-Res Doodle is a graphics system that allows you to make drawings on the screen and then paint them with a variety of colors. Pictures can be saved and loaded from disk. "Input" is through the keyboard or a game paddle input: joystick, Koala Pad, etc. "Functions" such as circle, frame, and rectangle are supported for those of us with less than steady hands.

An excellent feature is a command called 'checkpoint'. At any time you can set a checkpoint while drawing. Then, if you really screw things up, you can restore your picture to what it was at the last checkpoint!



"Paint" allows you to color-fill a bound area with a variety of colors. You're even allowed to enter text (UPPER and lower) to your pictures. Quite a complete little package, don't you think?

Complete documentation is on disk and there's even on-screen help at any time. Please remember that if you like this program you should send Hal \$10 (this is Personal Domain). Owners of the program will receive instructions on how to use Hi-Res Doodle from within their BASIC and assembly language programs.

Now as promised (threatened?) a few months ago, we have a new numbering scheme for the EAMON adventures. We think that it is much more useful/logical to try to use the numbers that most everybody else uses whenever possible. The list below is now definitive, but as always, it is best to request an adventure by Name, just to avoid any confusion. Also, EAMONs will be in somewhat short supply. Did you know that disks are heavy? Well they are, so we're not going to be lugging too many EAMONs around... maybe just 2 or 3 of each. So, please be advised that we may occasionally run out.

Rumored is a memory expansion board by Apple for the Apple //e (or ?). Expected to be announced in September. The board is supposed to be compatible with RAMWORKS and MultiRam IIe. It is not known if this will include a co-processor.

Expected around Christmas - announcement by Apple of a new floppy drive for the Apple II//s. May be the 3.5 inch Sony or a double5.25". Expected storage capacity 640K.

New -- Tymac has begun advertising a 3.5" floppy drive. Capacity 640K. No indication which model Apple it's for or cost.

Rumors about new Apple add-ons confirmed, but indications are that the dates will slip.

New -- Checkmate Technology has begun distribution of version 3.0 of their AppleWorks Memory Exander disk. Spreadsheet size is RAM dependent, the database will allow 5350 records per file.

Checkmate Technology will soon release their 16 bit 65C816 co-processor which docks on their MultiRam board in versions for the Apple //e and //c. Software publishers said to be ready to portsoftware over to the 16 bit format. Possible first program is a "highly rated Apple Sreadsheet which has a super name.

New for AppleWorks: Two "Desktop" systems, new book. Jeeves from PBI Software. An appointment calendar, directory and phone dialer, four function calculator, memo pad and software alarm clock. \$49.95.

at Apple Inc. At the time we were going to press with this issue, several national magazines including Electrical Engineering Times and InfoWorld published their "scoops."

The following is a summary of what I have read and heard recently.

Rumor: An expansion box that connects to the Mac to be announced at MacWorld Expo. Slots will accomodate non Apple controllers for such things as Disk drives and will, through a dealer Mod, operate much faster than current external devices.

Rumor: The Jonathan. A Mac with slots, 17" highresolution monochrome monitor (for full page display), 20 Mbyte hard disk, optical disk drive, 800Kbyte floppies, business style keyboard with track-ball, small footprint for CPU, etc. Software compatible with the regular Mac! To be announced at January stock holders' meeting. Probably won't ship until later in year.

This writer thinks that the Jonathan will be fairly expensive and will compete with machines such as the IBM AT or the Sun to capture "Engineering Workstation" type of business. I suspect the slot-box is being released to give third party developers a chance to design and build cards which will work in the slot-box or the Jonathan.

Rumor: Retrofit to 800Kbytes for installed 400Kbyte floppies. It has been reported in several places that the hang-up on the 800KBytes is due to a legal hastle between Sony who builds the drives and Tandon who holds the patents!

Rumor: Versa-Mac or Jason, which is a modular Mac with Color. Ship late '86.

Rumor: Apple is planning to put the fast 32 bit Motorola 68020 microprocessor chip in the Jonathan or some follow-on machine.

Rumor: Beck-Tech will announce an adpater to display MacPaint in Color. See InfoWorld, August 26.

H ints and Tips. That was the theme of the July 29 MacSIG.

Mike Carlson got things off to the usual 7:00 pm start at the Southdale Hennepin County Library, where about 80 gathered to see if there was a shortcut or two that they might pick up. The Mac is easy, but everyone wants to make it easier yet!

Tom Edwards and Curtis Juliber opened up the announcements with some information about the MacFest Computer Show. This will be held September 26-29 at the Hyatt Regency, downtown Minneapolis. The club will have a booth during the show, and volunteers are needed to man it during show hours. (Contact Tom Edwards or Steve George if you can assist. There is more information elsewhere in this newsletter.)

Our Q/A session brought forth lots of new little tidbits. Here's a sample:

- One of the developers present this eve is working on a program to manage news broadcasts over satelite TV.
- Anyone have a handle on how to set up an inventory program with Excel? Moving Multiplan templates into Jazz? Suggestions on what's good/bad with the various thin-to-fat offers? If so, drop a note to the newsletter editor, share your experience and earn a MacDOM for the effort!
- Apple has announced a 20 mb hard disk that may be on the shelves somewhere in the Sept/Oct period (And if you believe that, I've got a little property in Florida....)
- Apple has a rebate program for those purchasing Mac stuff. Check with your dealer for specifics, but you can make savings on things like modems, upgrades and software.
- Current (remember, dis here is da notes from da July meet'n!) version of Switcher is 4.0, touted as being a "release". (See Switcher Note elsewhere.)
- Video-out hardware for the Mac costs in the range of \$200. What you view it on can run into the thousands! One of the biggest and best is the unit from Hughes Aircraft.
- Neon, a newly released "object oriented" programming language, has a lot of features for the application developer.
- Videoworks (Hayden) is capable of creating output in color, folks. Does that turn any of you green with envy?
- MS Word is starting to show up in version 1.05, for those that have sent in their registration cards. Many of the new features and improvements relate to the LaserWriter. One neat thing, is the ability to designate a percent reduction (increase?) to artwork pasted in from the clipboard.
- Sider, a hard disk from First Class Peripherals, is rumored to be available in Mac configuration, and 20 mb size, about January 1.
- One Mac'er is getting radio reception through his phone lines. That makes it a bit hard to modemize, doesn't it? The "techies" suggest a call to Ma Bell.

Always willing to help with the control of insect pests, the bugswatters have been busy delving into the software nests. Some of the current crop of creepy crawlers have been warmed over, but there were a few new ones, too.

- » MacDraft, for those of you that enjoy the art of "draughting", tends to create some abberations when coupled with MacWrlte and the ImageWriter. Current version can't take things back into 'Write.
- The new Font/Desk Accessory Mover brings some problems to those that insist on sticking with the thin Mac. Certain fonts are not recognized, and the old Font Mover sticks up its nose at anything that it didn't create!
- Closely related to this problem, is the Apple-induced intolerance for some of the "3rd party" desk accessories. Apple and programmers are trying to negotiate a stage of co-existence. Look for updates on desk accessories to circumvent the problem.

A couple of new programs kicking about have some neat features. MultiScrap permits more than one "Scrapbook" on your disk. Doesn't seem to be perfect yet, but will allow you to customize a scrapbook for a special use.

Someone put together a single program that enables you to do all of the neat things that you always wanted to do with your fonts. Create them, edit them and move them with one super humungous program that does it all.



Summertime with MacSIG Continued

We sure don't want to ignore the rumor mill with this issue. Just to keep us all drooling, how would you like....

- A color Mac (no, not the Jackintosh or the 520ST!)...
- · A bigger screen for your Mac ...
- A Mac with "slots" so that you can plug in your favorite printer card, music keyboard or home controller device...
- MacinTalk, for those of you that work late into the night with your Mac and want someone to talk to...

Well, these are just a few of the wild "maybe's" that are currently floating about. You can set your own odds on what's true or false, and the timetable.

Swinging into the "tips" program for this evening, we heard foist from *Steve Wheeler*. Seems that *Steve* likes to go against the flow by just a touch. While most of us have tried to get MultiPlan to work with smaller fonts so we can see more on the screen, he wanted bigger fonts to create presentation reports.

Here's how:

- Create a disk with MultiPlan, Resource Mover (or something that lets you edit resources), and a "System".
- 2. Strip out the fonts you don't want.
- 3. Create (or identify) a font that you want to work with MultiPlan on the disk.
- 4. Open the Resource Mover.
- 5. Open the font that you want to be used by MultiPlan.
- 6. Change the ID of the font to "1290".
- 7. Using Resource Mover, open the "System" on the disk and open the "Fonts" in the system.
- 8. "Cut" any of the fonts in the system that have an ID of "1290" or "1300".
- 9. "Open" your chosen font.
- 10. "Copy" it.
- 11. Bring up the "System" window.
- 12. "Paste".
- 13. Quit Resource Mover and try out your MultiPlan to check out your plastic surgery.

Slick, huh? What I've omitted above, is the significence of the ID's 1290 and 1300. The 1290 is the screen and "standard" printout font accessed by MultiPlan. You need not go further if you intend to use the ImageWriter without triggering the "high quality" mode. If you do want "high quality", then go through the font creation steps and give a font that is twice the size of your desired printout the ID of 1300.

To pack more characters on the printed page, you can select "50% Reduction" from the "Printer Set Up menu", although that is contrary to *Steve's* effort here.

Look for *Steve's* contribution to show up in a future issue of MacWorld (he hopes!).


Our second Tip/Hint came from *Dan Buchler*. Dan's "hint" really is more of a caution to be considered when using Switcher (of course with a fat Mac) and installing Finder as one of the "applications" to be run.

Strange things can happen, often a crash, if you "Trash" a file with the Finder and then try to access it with another application that you are running with Switcher. Switcher gets confused, with all of these files to keep straight, if you toss out something or change its name.

As we came to the wrap-up for the evening, some pleas were issued for assistance. Being a volunteer organization, the quality of what you see and hear depends on what aid you are willing to give. If you can help with something, don't be shy!

MacSIG:ntu Tunes up with Resources

Let's Peek Inside the Macintosh by Tom Edwards

H elp comes to those that explore. So the MacSIG:ntu meeting of July 15 was targeted to those that wanted to stretch their understanding of the Mac, without getting too involved in the techno-jumble of the "hackers".

Steve Bibus welcomed us to the Southdale Hennepin County Library location that is almost like a home-awayfrom-home for all of the MacUsers. Zinging through the announcements of things to come, Steve then called on MacDOM editor Mark Richards for a rundown of what's available. MacDOM #13 features a sample of "educational" software, mainly from the college groups that are active in the Macintosh software development program. MacDOM #14 contains Switcher and the Resource Editor, subject of this evening's program presentation.

Jan Lovig, representing the MacFest show to be held this September 26-28, gave us a peek at what is in store for this major Macintosh computer show (more details elsewhere in this newsletter). Mini'app'les will have a booth at the show. You are invited to take in the show, volunteer to work at the booth and to enter the "MacArt" contest if you wish.

Our program featured a double whammy this evening. Paul Howe had things all lined up to fill us in on some of the magic things that you can do with the Resource Editor to customize things to your liking. Curtis Juliber was ready with an overview of OverVue, a database program, to help us all appreciate the power of the Mac and a good spreadsheet.

Paul explained that the Mac gets a great deal of the goodies that you see on the screen loaded in from the disk in the form of instructions. That means that much can be done to change the appearances of things, if you can find out where all this neat stuff is stored on the disk, load it in to Mac, change it and then save the changes back to the disk. The next time that you use the disk with the changes, they will show up on your screen. (Drum roll, please) Enter Resource Editor!

The Resource Editor (and several other similar utilities) give you the power to do this. It shows you a list of resources that you can change. Pick one, and you then enter an editing mode that is MacPaint-like (for changing graphics) or MacWrite-like (for editing text). When you are done, the Resource Editor places the new information back on the disk in the proper place. Nonetheless, a good practice for all of this customization is to do the work on a COPY of your valuable disk! Sometimes things don't work quite right.

Once you get a feel for this, you can get really creative. After the novelty of funny icons or humorous dialog boxes dims, you may want to look for more serious things to do. These editors can help you create a custom paintbrush in MacPaint, install "Command-Key" alternates for menu selections and modify programs to <u>your</u> concept of "friendly". Check through our MacDOMs for these editor aids. There's a bit of documentation to help you, too. Paul also gave a short demo of MacProject, a scheduling program from Apple. This scores high for ease of use, but lacks a bit for those that are in need of some intricate splitting of resources. The greatest benefit of the program, is the graphic presentation, which makes the whole scheduling and work flow process easy to visualize.

Can't find a program or file, but you know that it's on one of your disks somewhere? Paul suggests MacCatalog, a program that will read in the list of files on your disks and create a database from them. Then you can do "searches" and run reports to help you organize all of that information.

Curtis then stepped to the front to tell us about a database program that he enjoys using (and many others, too). OverVue is a database program that keeps the entire file in the memory of the Mac as you use it. This means that things can be moved around easily, and "sorts" (the "ho-hum" part of most database work) can be completed in little more that the blink of an eye. There is no need to read records from the disk each time you look for something or reorganize your information.

OverVue has just been upgraded with some useful features. The new version, 2.0, adds graphs and a "relational" ability... data from one file can be "linked" to another file, eliminating the need to key in the info twice (or more!). Information can be exchanged with other programs, too. A number of math functions are available, and you create "formletters" right within OverVue.


One of the kinky things that makes OverVue different, is that the information shows on the screen in a "spreadsheet" format. You see twenty or so records at a time, and can scroll up, down, left or right through the display.

Did you learn something here tonight? We hope so. This is the type of informative program that you get each month from the MacSIG:non-technical user meeting. Come visit us next month!






