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



earning to type takes a lot of concentration and practice. If you worked hard at it, you could develop some proficiency but would never set any for speed or accuracy. CompuKeys is a program that is designed to help you learn to type, primarily in a classroom setting with support from an instructor. As you go through the program, you develop both speed and accuracy by emphasis on learning correct finger placement and reach so that you can attain a reasonable level of your potential.

president of the Gary McLean, company, described the objectives and the development process of the program at his presentation to the Mini'app'les meeting May 16th. For the school environment, there are reward levels that can be achieved upon the successful completion of a unit. Even these sections are designed to reinforce the basic typing skills. Gary has a background in education, and the company has continued that focus with a program that has strong management utilities for the classroom.

Vice president and chief programmer Ron Geiser demoed the program for the club, with commentary by Gary on the features that were being shown. A moderate typist can expect to double production after practicing with the

program. Speeds of 80-100 words per minute are not unrealistic, with increased accuracy. Help with the proper finger and reach positions is always just a keystroke away. This is provided by a keyboard illustration and animated hands to show the way that the key in question is accessed. All elements of the program are designed with a planned approach to learning, not just a "drill and practice" exercise.

Currently written for the Apple //e, the program is fast enough to stay ahead of any typist. On a 64K machine, there is minimal disk access when switching different sections of hetween program, but never when in a given For the instructor, there are section. management plenty of accommodate several classes. student can have his or her own practice disk, and if the inevitable happens, a reconstruction can be made from the master that will return the student to the level last recorded on the master. The AppleWorks Advisor

A Column For Users Of AppleWorks

Desktop Accessories

ast winter the first of the Desktop Accessory software packages for AppleWorks were released. These were Pinpoint and Jeeves. Both Desktop systems are designed to run behind AppleWorks.

These products have been thoroughly reviewed in Apple-oriented magazines. Suffice to say that Pinpoint and Jeeves do not have the same intended use. What Jeeves does, it seems to do well. Pinpoint, a more ambitious package, has met with widely varied response, in my experience. Some persons have had no difficulty; others have not been so fortunate. Reports I have heard and read Bulletin Boards indicate many compatibility problems. Pinpoint is hard at work trying to deal with these difficulties. It appears that Pinpoint is a software package "released before its time." I think I will let this one simmer for a while.

Just in the "nick of time" I received an announcement which has revived my interest in Apple Desktop Accessory packages. Yes, I said Apple, not AppleWorks. As nifty as an AppleWorks desktop package is, I (we) do not all run AppleWorks all the time. Enter FINGERTIPS!

To quote from the Fingertips brochure, "If you use an Apple][,][Plus, //e or //c with DOS or ProDOS, 48K, 64K, 128K or more, you can benefit from Fingertips".

This new Desktop package comes in versions, **FINGERTIPS** PROGRAMMER'S FINGERTIPS. These packages will run in the background of many software applications and as a stand alone too.

The accessories available at a single keystroke with Fingertips are, Full Function Calculator (business & scientific with "tape print-out" on screen), Monthly Appointment Calendar

Appointment Planner, Notepad, Cardfiler and Phone Directory, Telecom and Instant DOS/ProDOS (functions).

PROGRAMMER'S **FINGERTIPS** include (briefly), Notepad, Calendar, Calculator, 40/80/high-res screen dump, Applesoft Tools, Machine Language Tools, Disk Tools (DOS 3.3 & ProDOS), Hexadecimal Calculator, and more. you are into programming, check it out.

A couple of persons whose judgment I trust, who worked with Fingertips development, recently indicated that it is very good. I am waiting patiently (?) for my Fingertips to arrive. More about this later.

Tip: In the AppleWorks database there is an Apple Ditto command A-" which copies the entry above the one the cursor is located on. This command does not work as

expressed. The Apple Ditto command is actually an A-'. Apple "flxed" this error by stating in the manual "do not press Shift" (See page 62 of the AppleWorks Reference manual). This discrepancy is explained in AppleWorks Tips & Techniques on page 114.

- Q. Why does the page number on a data base report wrap down onto the next line?
- A. I experienced this problem myself recently. I don't know what the rules are for this, but if you allow for a more generous right margin for the report, it should print the page number in the correct place.
- Tip: If you are entering printer setup codes into AppleWorks and they do not seem to work, although you are sure you are entering the right codes, try this: enter upper case characters using the SHIFT key, not the CAPS LOCK. It appears that AppleWorks

does not recognize an upper case character in a control command, unless it is entered with the SHIFT, at least sometimes. I had a similar problem in a different spreadsheet program too.

- Q. I am using an Applied Engineering memory board and their AppleWorks expand software. After using the expand utility disk to expand 2 AppleWorks working disks, I find that the utility disk will not allow me to make any more expanded disks. What is wrong?
- A. It appears to me that the expand utility disk you have is defective. These disks are not copy protected and there is no limit on the number of times you may use the disk to make expanded working disks. See a dealer to get a replacement for the utility disk or call Applied Engineering.
- Q. I tried to load a file and received a message saying the file was segmented and prompting for another data disk. The file(s) should not have

had to be segmented as it (they) was not large enough to need that and there was plenty of room available on the disks. I am using an Applied Engineering board.

A. I am puzzled regarding why you are getting the segmented file message, unless the file was saved as segmented. It is possible that your working copy of the expanded AppleWorks is bad. Try making another. If the expand utility disk is bad, see a dealer or call Applied Engineering.

June Software

NEED HELP! [Boy do I ever!] No, now seriously folks, even though I've just recently been reelected to the position of Software Director (thank you one and all), I could sure use some help checking out some of the new stuff which is starting to come in from other groups. We have literally doubled the number of disks available in the past year. [And we're not even counting the easy stuff like Nuff said. 180+ sides of CP/M!] YOU'RE gonna help, right?

I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank Dick Peterson (our new Branch Director) for the time and effort he has expended helping me in the past year with getting software ready for your written has consumption. He reviews/critiques, written programs which fixed bugs in programs as received forwarded notes IAC, from disks/programs which have incorporated into the verbiage you read here every month, etc, etc, etc.

Others who have helped in the form of Personal Domain reviews include: Jim Janelle Norris SIG), (Ed (Secretary), and Paule Craton.

Well, enough sentiments (and begging)! On to this month's THREE new disks. First we have a double-sided disk which contains the newest implementation of the Forth language: F83X. Next, DOM #40 which is material received from the Apple Corps of Dallas in a recent And, finally, a Personal exchange. Domain disk which will 'crop' a hires picture and save the section for use with Print Shop.

F83X [Forth] public domain

This is THE new standard for the Forth language put together by the Standards Committee and they feel it will be good for 4 to 5 years.

In addition to the double-sided disk, there is printed doc. Originally about 30% consisted of screen dumps for the Kernel and Utility. I have opted to let the user do this if he wishes, which brings the total pages of doc down to a

'manageable' 72 pages. By the time you read this I will have (hopefully) a small supply printed in small manual format. We will be charging \$5 for the doc and \$5 for the double-sided disk.

From the doc: "This self-compiling implementation of Forth-83 for the Apple][contains complete source and documentation for all required words, standard extensions, controlled reference words, and official proposals, including search order specification and control. It also includes the Starting Forth line editor (with extensions), a full screen editor, assembler, debugger, decompiler which produces compilable Forth for the author's Easy words. ordinary Directory System, multi-column printing used utilities utility, and all Three lores developing the system. graphic demo's are included as well."

Will Baden of FIG (FORTH Interest Group) Orange County Chapter (CA) has placed this system into the public domain.

Print Shop Utility Personal Domain

Here's a nifty little disk for those of you who enjoy using Brøderbund's Print Shop. Basically it allows you to load in any standard hires picture (33 or 34 sectors) that you have. The pictures can be from other programs, pictures you've drawn yourself, or just about any other source. Once loaded in, you then select the portion of the picture to be saved. The saved portion will be in Print Shop format and be available for use by the Print Shop program.

Works on any Apple 2 series computer; requires only one drive; you must have Brøderbund's Print Shop; an initialized DOS 3.3 disk for storage; joystick or AppleMouse // optional.

A few full-size pictures are included for testing out the program. The most useful is one called PI.PRINT SHOP. Ten 'Print Shop-sized' graphics are also included and are all ready to be loaded into the Print Shop for your use.

The fix: using the /IAC.42/FIN Prefix UNLOCK file AMORTIZE.PRINT. Change the PR#0 in line 320 to PRINT CHR\$(4) "PR#0". Also change the end of line 1071 from PR#1 to PRINT CHR\$(4) "PR#1". [While you're at it you might look at line 1075 which contains a printer set-up string and alter it to your needs.] Then Save the file and LOCK it. This has been done to the Library disks.

Next UNLOCK BUDGET.ANALYSIS and list and trace over the following line numbers: 810, 1025, 1240, 1425, & 1625. [There may be more lines which cause a SYNTAX ERROR, so let me know if you find them when the program is run.] Then SAVE the file and LOCK it. For some reason there are extra spaces between the POKEs in each of the above lines and the address to be poked. By over the lines, tracing Applesoft reconstructs the program line eliminating the excess spaces. Weird. This has been done to the Library disks.

IAC 53 BUG: Line 210 of the HELLO program is incorrect. It should read:

210 HOME : PRINT : PRINT CHR\$ (4);

"RUN TUTORIAL.HELLO"

instead of "... HELLO.TUTORIAL". Make the change and save it to disk with SAVE HELLO. Disks since about 2 weeks after its issuance have all had this change made. For now (and a few more months to come), you can tell if your disk has already had the bug fixed: the red stripe on the disk label.

TRAIL SIZE TOOLBOX FIXES: per Mike Ching writing in the Honolulu groups publication H.A.U.S.: Two programs need fixes: The Toolbox Series Demo and The Video Toolbox Demo. For each, insert into line 2 somewhere near the beginning of the line: CALL 1002. Also change the SPEED= 255 to SPEED= 254. [I haven't tried all possible combinations of the various demos, but the numerous combinations I

have tried lead me to believe that this fix may not be necessary. As long as it works for me, I won't fix it if it ain't broke. So, the Masters in the disk library do not contain these changes.] If you find the need for them, let me know the circumstances under which they are required, and we'll then decide whether to update the library's disks.

CATALOG CORRECTIONS: We do not have the Pascal disks listed. A mixup on my part caused the wrong list to be printed. We have 8 Pascal disks presently in the library. They are ATTACH:, COMPUTE:, PMU:, PUG1:, PASEX1:, PROSE:, PROSTXT:, and DARYL1:. And we have 4 disks from Washington Apple Pi (PIG1-4) which are imminently available.

IAC 40-43 were inadvertently left out. IAC 40 is Pilot -> BASIC, 41: AppleWriter [Utility Disk, 42: ProDOS Disk Prefix, and 43: FreeWriter & ProDOS Tech Notes.

FontWorks

A Review by John Rettger

Works on Apple I, II+, //e, //c.

eople who want to print in fancy type styles may want to take a look at FontWorks (published by The Software Touch and written by Mark Simonsen of Beagle Brothers fame). It is compatible with 35 printers. Available for \$49.95, it comes with both ProDOS and Dos 3.3, so that it can be used with any program which prints text files. One especially good feature is its capability of printing sideways for extra-wide spreadsheets. It also has a font editor. You can make your own fonts from scratch, customize those already on the disk, or make small designs or drawings.

The best feature of FontWorks is the quality of the large type styles. One letter or number is formed on a matrix of up to 256 rounded dots, so that when printed on (say) an ImageWriter II with quality paper and a reasonably good ribbon, the result is superb. There is a nice variety of type styles, too. These include Old English, sans-serif in light,

medium, and bold, and some creative and graceful fonts including some that are understated enough to be used for general correspondence. If I had a complaint about the type styles, it would be there is no proportional spacing (so that the "I" and other thin letters take up less space on the line than large ones such as "M" or "W"). (Like this newsletter - Ed.) With more elegant type styles and lengthier texts, proportional seems more attractive and easier to read.

There are 20 fonts altogether. About half are smaller (8 x 8 dots). They tend to be crude and only two are interesting: one with Greek letters and another very tiny one which would be great for spreadsheets that you hope the board of directors won't be able to read. You can print several fonts on a page (by using a backslash code). But, most people wouldn't mix the small and large fonts because of the differences in size and quality.

There are two principal complaints that I have with the program. The first is that it attempts to ride AppleWorks' coattails but at several key points it departs from the AppleWorks format. For example, when you go to print, it asks:

Print from? Beginning This file Cursor

Experienced AppleWorks users may well overlook the instruction in the documentation that if you select "Beginning" it means that you will be printing all the files on the desktop. If you intend to print only one of several files, you have to choose "This file" (which in AppleWorks is "This page").

A more serious complaint is that it will not actually print AppleWorks files. You must save as a text file, either ASCII or as a formatted text file achieved by printing to disk. It really

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MacSIG:ntu - April

A Little Dot Goes a Long Way

ou've known about the fine graphics capabilities of the Mac for quite some time... that was one of its primary


differences from other computers since it was first introduced. If you experimented with MacPaint... and haven't we all?... those same graphics were a point of wonder and satisfaction as you churned them out on your computer and committed them to paper with your ImageWriter. But if you saw some MacDraw images laid to paper by a Laserwriter, it was evident that there was still room for improvement.

Now we all know of at least one other way to get that improvement. This can be done by scanning artwork with the Abaton scanner, a device that offers 300 dot per inch resolution, four times that of a MacPaint drawing. And this high resolution can be fed into your Mac in a few seconds, capturing line art or even halftone images, diddled and cropped with some software, and then transfered to paper by way of the Laserwriter. This added range for the Mac was demonstrated to the MacSIG:ntu group at their April 7th meeting. The demo was introduced by Curtis Juliber, MacSIG:ntu coordinator, with the courtesy of Blumberg Photo-Sound, represented by Pete Wolf.

On a 512K Mac, the Abaton can commit about a half page (8" x 5") area into the software. More memory allows more scanned area, so a MacPlus would do (practically) a full page. Actually, Pete says that a full page, 8.5" x 11", gobbles 1.2 megabytes. This is transferred in a significantly faster manner than the ThunderScan device, needing only a few seconds instead of several minutes. Speed is more comparible to some of the video digitizers. Naturally, there are trade-offs. Abaton can accept only flat art and photo materials. But there is no problem with your subject moving and "smearing" the picture, as with a video scan. The "gray scale" can be adjusted to gain sensitivity to color and represent them as different shades of gray, and the "contrast" can be adjusted... something that Pete said was better seen than described.

At \$2495, there is a select audience

for the Abaton. However, the output from the Laserwriter, either line art or halftone, is excellent. And the ability to have an image in digital memory offers an artist an unlimited easel for experimentation and manipulation. Pete and Blumberg, for an interesting journey into the world of smaller and smaller dots. (Editor's note: The Abaton scanner is made by MicroTech, who also market the device under their name. MicroTech and Abaton will be offering character recognition software, to be released near the end of this year, which will enable your system to translate scanned text to actual text code.)



The Abaton Scanner was demonstrated at the April MacSIG meeting.

Question and Answer Time

- The latest releases of Copy II Mac, version 5.2, and MacBackup, version 4.0, will be able to do their magic with MacPlus' 800K disk drives.
- Laserwriter, as a service, is available from a number of dealers. Kinko's offers "open 24 hours" service at the outlet in the U of M area. Price per page can vary a great deal at different places, but is usually 50¢ to a dollar per page.
- New versions of Excel (Microsoft, version 1.01) and Jazz (Lotus, version 1a) are on the scene. Jazz also struts a \$200 price reduction, supposedly justified by reduced program capacity.
- Does OverVue insist on giving you an error message when you use it with a wide carriage ImageWriter? Ignore it and proceed. Unfortunately, no one

- knows how to purge it from the system by correcting whatever set of conditions triggers it.
- Should you use single-sided rated disks instead of double-sided rated disks in your 800K drive? Go for it! If they initialize, they will work fine, since that is supposedly the "test" that the manufacturer runs to certify the surface.

A few last-minute announcements signalled the approaching windup for this meeting. Dan Buchler would like to have someone take over the coordination of the "calendar" for the newsletter. It entails collecting the data and formatting it for the calendar, then moderning it to Dan. Bill Engle has switched to a Mirror Technology internal SCSI disk for his Mac. That should lead to a "For Sale" ad in the classifieds for his first adventure, the Tecmar 10 MB drive that is almost as old as Mac.

Parts is Parts! or, Up Your Mac

acSIG continues to draw the interest and attendance of the Mini'app'les members. The "regular" Mac Special Interest Group pulled about 70 or 80 away from awaking spring-evening activities for the April 28th meeting. Mike Carlson managed to cover the hosting assignment very well, and got right into the substance of the meeting at the Edina Community Center.

Since the subject of this meeting was to be "what I did for my up-grade, and how it worked out", there was a very obvious do-it-yourself exchange of selfhelp questions and answers to get things started. As with all steps up the upgrade ladder, buried within the balm of good ointment are the ultimate flies, some big and some small, but all an annovance. Setting the pace was the announcement that the latest official versions of Finder and System are 5.2 and 3.1, respectively. If you are having problems, especially if you are working with the MacPlus, 800K and/or hard drives, search out these versions, or higher, to begin your quest for restitution.

This month's bug report included these medflies (...get it? Medflies... fruit... Apple... Mac. Aw, forget it!):

- MacTracks on the Plus system comes up with troubles regardless of the Finder used, particularly with hard disks.
- Tecmar, one of the pioneer hard drives for the Mac, "doesn't compute" with the HFS software.
- Those who may be experiencing an unexplained change of defaults associated with the "Chooser" are advised to try turning off the "Cache RAM" from the "Control Panel."
- Multiplan 1.1 has been successfully copied by Copy J[Mac and runs on the 512K Mac. The current combination of versions does not create a copy that will work on the Plus.

Moving to items that do not seem to be upgrade related, spelling checker programs seem to be getting a lot of press these days, but there was precious little "hands-on" experience within the

MacLightning, MacSpell+, club. MacGas. MacSpellRight Spellswell all got mentions. warning was offered by a MacSIGer about Hayden's speller. He found that the process of correcting spelling somehow managed to corrupt the original file. Hummm... An attempt to copy Psion Chess brought an unwelcome discovery to another member. The original disk appears to be erased in the process. This brought forth a suggestion for all those about to copy; please "write protect" any original disk before you begin.

Those with two computers (or more). or those working in an environment where brands and systems are intermixed. are finding a need to transfer files between these dissimilar environments. The physical transfer is usually done by directly connecting the computers with a cable, or indirectly with modems, and using communication programs to move the messages. There are a number of dedicated programs that assist; some provide limited or specific "conversion" processing to enable the captured data to be translated for the new environment. A common key in this operation often is the ASCII or DIF file. Those working with the PFS series of programs will find that "The Bridge" program will do a lot of this preparation work, since it is not provided by the utility section of many of the PFS programs.

What I did for my Upgrade

In June, the MacSIG will be actually watching as an upgrade is done to a Mac (at Waterborne Electronic Labora-Tonight's program was a free exchange of experiences by those who have already undertaken some portion of the journey. The initial 128K Mac is a fairly rare animal these days, judging by some impromptu surveys that started the discussion. Many have moved to 512K status or beyond. The route followed has been varied as well. Some have stuck with the Apple-sanctioned pathway, but many others have sought out "third party" vendors to follow their dreams. This second path bears some risk, but through a studied choice, you can often

gain similar position with no additional financial risk even if that "catastrophic" happening should force you to Apple for service on (heaven forbid!) an "unauthorized modification."

To balance this risk, the third party vendor offers quality work at lower price, or for a similar bank note will give you "more" than available through Apple. Many of the "best" upgrade options will provide means to remove evidence of your indulgence without a trace for Apple to cry "foul" over. Memory boosts to 4 MB, internal hard drives, SCSI ports and even "supercharged" processors (aka 68020) are possible, most at a price that can be afforded by the more determined Mac-er.

Some caveats must be entered into the record, as witnessed by the more technically-oriented members in the group: electronics can fail. Just because your Mac has "run for years with no problem" doesn't mean that it isn't right on the verge of doing something nasty, whether or not you have something done to it. Apple's power supply is no heavyweight, and an ill-designed package could add just enough load to send a marginal system to that big chip on the sky. Heat is one of the scourges of chips, so be sure to let your machine breathe fresh, cool air by keeping the vent slots unrestricted. Those contemplating 2 or 4 MB injections (4's the limit with current software onboard the Mac) should check the possibility of adding a fan to keep the machine's cool, and more importantly, your cool.

The most trying issue is always that of software. Even Apple, that paragon of "Thou shalt not violate the Mac interface", has found some embarrassing faux pas, necessitating issues of revisions to "final" software. If you persevere, you will be rewarded with a faster Mac, able to leap tall spreadsheets at a single bound and grub through the deepest of databases with diligent determination. Soon, the SCSI port's promise will begin to come to light, as Mac's ability to plug into the world is exploited.

Some sage advise was offered by Ramsey Smith, as this voyeur's dream

Accounting for the Rest of Us

ohn James was well prepared to show how he uses his Mac to keep track of household expenses, manage the checkbook, maintain an inventory of assets on a room-by-room basis and have all records ready for the 1040 caper in the blink of an eye. He was ready to present a run-down of his experiences with the popular program, Dollars and \$ense.

Curtis Juliber and Dave Stovall got the Mac Non-Technical Users settled down for the May 5th meeting at the Edina Community Center. Foremost on the agenda was what to present to the group at future meetings. Some of the suggested topics were Beck-Tech (MonsterMac memory upgrades), Andy Hertzfeld (author of MacPaint... now, wouldn't that be a coup?), telecommunications, 3-D drawing programs, ComixWorks (a program that helps you draw cartoon panels for the funny papers), and basic "How to's" (how to get the most out of 'Write, 'Paint, your printer and more). With a well as deep as that, there is a long and profitable series of interesting meetings on the horizon for the MacSIG:ntu. Watch this space for coming features to keep your appetite whetted.

Tonight's Q and A's were on the brief side. As usual, the intent was to put someone with an answer in touch with someone with a question. That happened with questions on communications, accounting and ReadySetGo, among other things.

Curtis then introduced John for the review of Dollars and Sense. It was quickly obvious that John has worked the buns off of this program and has it doing what he needs it to do. explained how to start with some preset accounts (if you like) for basic use in household management or tax records. If you are planning to try to manage a business with this program, it should work well for a small demand situation, but an accountant might find shortcomings with some of the auditing The account names can be practices. changed and things added or deleted to begin the year's records, if the program's selectidon't tailor precisely to your wishes.

There is a budgeting function that


completes the initial setup. Here, you take a guess as to what you will spend or earn for that particular account during the year. Reports track your performance against that measure. The adventurous will try to "fine tune" budgets so that the differential to actual performance is very small.

One of the program's features is that you can "extend" your accounts into the setup for the second year's accounting. This reduces the most time consuming part of getting started to almost no effort for the new year. John also liked the reporting functions of the program. Through selecting detailed criteria, you can quickly gain specific information of a particular activity. Applying this process to the graphing section of the

program creates functional charts that display the information in an easily understood manner that helps to spot trends of the activity.

John runs this program on a 128K Mac. Although a second drive is highly recommended (indeed, isn't that always?), the program does work with only one drive. There is plenty of capacity for most householder's needs on a 400K disk.

The most amazing thing was that John can enter his week's checkbook activity in about 5 minutes time. Egad! He's got to be organized to the Max! It would take me several times that, just to find the checkbook!

Communications

If you are communicating to another computer, don't have a dedicated phone line and have call waiting on the line, (you obviously don't want to have it turned off), you know how frustrating it can be when someone calls you and your modem hangs up. No problem. Have call forwarding added to your telephone line and forward all your calls to the same number. When someone calls you, the call will be forwarded to the same mumber and the caller gets a busy signal.

Confidential Data

If you have confidential data on floppy disks, remember that deleting a file doesn't delete the data. The data is still on that disk, accessible from Fedit and from recovery tools like Mac Zap and Copy II Tools. It doesn't get removed until another file is written on top of it.

Goodie Of The Month - MacWait

When you launch MacWait, it installs a small bit of code into the system before returning to the finder. From then on, whenever the cursor turns into the waitwatch (signifying a lengthy pause) MacWait spins the minute hand! MacWait is available on Compuserve, GEnie or from 1st Step Computers Public Domain Library (both locations).

Finder

An alternative start-up screen that takes up no extra disk space is to modify the "Welcome To Macintosh" start-up screen on your disk. Using FEdit, follow these steps:

- · Select open file from the file menu.
- Open the System file of the disk you wish to alter.
- Select display sectors in ASCII from the display menu.
- Check resource fork on the options menu.
- Select read sector from the edit menu. Type sector "6".
- Select ASCII modify from the edit menu.
- Write over the words "Welcome To Macintosh" with your own message. The message cannot exceed the length of the message "Welcome To Macintosh". It can be shorter; type in blank spaces to fill the gaps.
- · Select write sector from the edit menu.
- · Ouit FEdit.

(Editor's note: It is strongly recommended that you do not do this on a master disk. Make a copy and work on the System on the copy only!)

Hold down the option key when clicking in the close box of the active window, and all windows get closed.

If you copy a folder from one disk to another and the destination disk already has a folder with the same name, you get the familiar message, "Replace Items With The Same Name?" I would expect this to mean that only files in the original folder will replace files by the same name in the folder on the destination disk, leaving intact files in the second folder that don't exist in the original folder.

Wrong. What it means is that the first folder will completely replace the second folder, no matter what is in either of them. Be careful!

Finder version 4.1 or higher can perform super clean-up operations by holding down the option key while selecting the clean up option. The icons are shuffled into place much faster, and are put into locations near the top of the window.

Set startup is the quick way to get right to the application on whatever startup disk you're using. You simply click on the application you want the disk to boot with. Then select "set startup" from the special menu. The next time you boot the disk, it'll bypass the desktop and go straight to the application (MacPaint, MacWrite, etc...).

Selecting mutiple documents or applications: Hold down the shift key and click on each document or application as needed.

To change the dominant system file: Hold down the option and command keys and double click on the finder icon (inside of the system folder) of the disk you wish to become the new startup disk.

Data manipulation: To move a window without making it the active window, hold down the command key before you drag it.

Empty folders take up no descernible memory. This means that you may name a folder "FONTS & D.A. IN SYSTEM". Then fill it with empty folders bearing the names of currently installed fonts or desk accessories.

Trash files with the option key held down. It will throw a file away even if it is locked. This saves a trip to get info in the file menu to unlock it. Files thrown into the trash can are not removed until you specifically empty trash, launch any application, or take any action that takes you off of the desktop. Emptying the trashcan sends its contents off into permanent electronic oblivion.

Never shut the Mac off without first ejecting all disks. This protects against accidentally damaging disk files.

To print without loading the application, select the document and choose print from the file menu.

Macintosh will load the application/document for you.

To print mutiple documents select



the documents (see selecting mutiple documents) and choose print from the file menu.

Font D/A Mover

Holding the Option key down when opening Apple's Font/DA mover will bring it up in desk accessory mode and holding it down when you select the open button will bring up all of the files on a disk rather than just the System and DA files. The latter installs DA's in applications as well as in the System.

Hold the option key down while loading. It will go straight into desk accessories rather than fonts.

Hard Disks

Hard disks aren't outrageously fragile, but you do need to take care of them. One important thing is not to cause fast temperature changes — don't bring a hard disk in from a hot car and start it up in an air-conditioned room. Let the temperature equalize (for an hour or two) first.

Hard Disk 20

Not putting too many files in any one folder reportedly speeds things up. (Editor's note: This is really intended for HD-20 users operating with a Mac-512 rather than a Mac Plus and finder 5.1 upwards.)

Imagewriter

The ImageWriter has a magnet embedded in the left side of its cover. Never lay a disk on top of the ImageWriter unless you really like losing data files.

The author of a letter printed in the MACazine Mac Mail column says that you can make a homemade printer stand for your ImageWriter for less than \$10. Check out an Eldon legal-size letter tray. Base dimensions are 12.5 by 17 inches, and when stacked upside down, they provide storage for two types of tractor paper ready for loading, and will support an Imagewriter on its four feet with no loss of stability. The bottom of the tray on which the printer sits is slanted forward a few degrees and even has a lip to prevent the printer from slipping. Most office supply stores carry the Eldon line of products.

Most print spoolers apparently have trouble working with the ImageWriter II. The explanation on CompuServe was that the ImageWriter II is supposed to send a message back to the Mac, saying what kind of printer it is, but the spoolers are set up to handle output only, not input to the Mac.

MacDraw

To redraw the same type of object that was most recently drawn on the screen, instead of re-selecting the action from the icon panel, just hold down the command key and click at the place the new object is to be drawn. The previous action will be selected automatically. Furthermore, all of the objects drawn while the command key is depressed will be selected when the command key and mouse button are released.

With MacDraw, it's easy to print out a MacPaint screen in fatbits mode. First, copy the MacPaint document into the clipboard, then quit MacPaint. Without resetting the Mac, launch MacDraw and paste from the edit menu. Then press command-g to group all the pixels together. At this point, it's best to choose the wide option from the Page-Setup dialog box or use the drawing size option to make the document a couple of pages bigger and then choose Rreduce to fit to give you a reduced version onscreen. Click once on the collection of pixels, which will give it some handles, and then drag one of the corners diagonally to stretch the whole image. Stretch it as big as you like, using the normal size option to see its real size. When you're finished, print the file out and you'll find that it will come out much larger than MacPaint alone would allow.

MacPaint

If you hold down the command key while quitting MacPaint, it will do a system restart.

MacWrite

If you are writing a report that requires an unnumbered title page, MacWrite can accommodate you. Select title page from under the format menu, and no header or footer information will appear on the first page (either on screen or the printed copy). You can tell the title page is selected when it has a tick next to it when the format window is open.

To make the second page of a document the first numbered page, go back to the format menu and select the set page #... option and enter a zero.

The only problem with this technique is that you can't choose to print the title page only. Selecting to print from 0 to 0 results in the entire document being printed out. If you need to only print the title page, just go back to the set page # option and specify the title page as page one. (If you don't

save the change, the program will default back to a title page numbered "0".)

In Word or MacWrite, typing shiftoption-space will insert a "sticky space." This fixed-size space, larger than a normal character, will join two words so they can't be split between lines by word wrap. It might be used, for example, in "Mr. Smith" so the words can't be split.

If you hold down the control key while backspacing, you'll retrieve all that has been removed by backspacing, including spaces, all the way up to the time you quit your application. You can save or even close the document and it'll all still be there. Command/backspace is the exact reverse of the backspace function. You won't, however, retrieve what has been highlighted and backspaced. The control/backspace function comes in handy as an unlimited alternative to the clipboard where a cut will erase whatever already happens to reside there. This is especially handy when switching the positions of two adjacent words or misplaced letters. Backspace over one, move the cursor into position and command/backspace what you just removed back onto the page. The stored information will enter your document wherever the cursor is. If you're already saving something you want to remain in the clipboard it can be equally useful to command/backspace over larger areas. **GOTO18**

Microsoft Excel

Microsoft's Excel will only use up to a maximum of 1 megabyte of memory. If I load up a couple of programs in Switcher on a Mac XL or Monster Mac (both of which have 2 megabytes of memory) and have used up the first megabyte of memory, Excel won't load because it won't recognize that second megabyte. It has to be one of the first applications loaded, so that it is running in the first megabyte.

Microsoft Word

If the Mac bombs when you're using Word, the document often disappears, leaving your hard work in limbo—don't open up Word again until you first copy all the 'MW000_' and 'Word Rescue' files onto a spare floppy disk. You should rename them to names of your own choosing to be safe.

Next, you should make a copy of the floppy disk — this will be the one to "hack on." Using John Mitchell's FEdit or Central Point's MacTools, you can now examine the Word files, looking for the one you lost — it might be the MW0008 file, for example. Once you've found it, you can again use FEdit or MacTools to change the file type from WTMP to WDBN. At this point, try opening it again from Word — if you're lucky, you'll have almost everything you lost.

Minifinder

up moving from To speed one install the application to another, Minifinder on almost all disks. The whole idea of the Minifinder, of course, is that you don't go back to the desktop when you quit an application. But there are times when you'll want the desktop—to delete files, for example. The usual way to do this is to click on the finder button in the Minifinder. But here's a handy undocumentated feature: if you hold down the option key when you quit an application, you will bypass the Minifinder and go directly to the But don't hold down the command key too, or the finder will rebuild the (invisible) desktop file and you'll find that all your folders have been renamed "Unnamed #...."

Miscellaneous

Extension cord for your printer: Radio Shack has a joystick extension cord, part #276-1978 that works perfectly. It

consist of a ten-foot cable with a ninepin D-sub connector at each end, all nine pins wired straight through. It plugs right into the Macintosh and works with the ImageWriter I, Apple Modem 300 or 1200 (not the personal modem) and the mouse. Best of all, it costs only \$3.99.

Multi-Scrap

If you want to convert a regular Apple Scrapbook so it can be found by MultiScrap, all you have to do is change the file type and creator. Use John Mitchell's Fedit program or Central Point's MacTools, and change the file type to "scrp" and the creator to "mscr."

Startup problems

A "sad Mac" icon at startup time, where the code is 0F000D, usually means that the programmer's switch on the left side of the Mac is jammed. Make sure it's in the right slots and not too far back. (0F0064 means the System file is missing.)

If you get the bombed disk icon, try turning off the Mac, insert the bombed disk, hold down the command-option keys, and turn the Mac on. This creates a new desktop file on the disk (This may not always work but it's worth a try).

Another way to get into a bad disk is to start out with another disk, then eject it once the desktop is drawn. Insert the damaged disk. If the data hasn't been totally fried, the Mac should ask you if you want to repair the disk.

If your disk doesn't show a bomb icon, but merely gets spit out, it isn't damaged at all. It just lacks a system file

If the Mac won't accept a badly damaged disk for erasure or reinitialization, there is a way to fool it into thinking it is reading a blank disk: First use the finder to eject any disks in the drive. Then look carefully at the right-hand side of the disk drive slot, where you'll find a small black lug next to a metal pin. Carefully press this down and the Mac thinks you just inserted a blank disk, prompting the dialog box that asks if you want to initialize it. Insert the bad disk into the drive and click the initalize box. Needless to say, all files will be lost-but this is only a way to re-claim the disk, not the data.

If the system bombs and the sad Mac face comes up, making it impossible to eject the disk from the finder, reset the Mac while holding down the mouse button. The disk should

should pop right out of the internal drive. This trick won't work on disks in the external drive.

In dire cases, eject a disk by pushing a straightened paper clip into the small hole just to the right of the disk drive slot.

Trash

You can throw away locked icons without unlocking them if you hold down the Option key while you drag the icons into the trash.

The Option and Command keys on the Mac serve as the missing second and third mouse buttons that everyone but Apple seems to have included on their mice. These are very powerful keys and have interesting and often undocumented effects in many software packages. Another special key combination is Command-Shift. Function keys are built into the Mac's system and are often undocumented little gems. Experiment with these keys and if you find any new shortcuts or effects, please let me know; I'll include them in my next Macs Faxs. Leave EMail on GEnie (J.Butler).

COMMAND A selects all disks or files while in the finder.

COMMAND E ejects the disk selected.

COMMAND-BACKSPACE will undo a backspace of up to 45 characters.

COMMAND-SHIFT-1 ejects the disk in drive 1 without closing the file.

COMMAND-SHIFT-2 ejects the disk in drive 2 without closing the file.

COMMAND-SHIFT-3 takes a snapshot of the screen and saves it as a MacPaint document (if you hold down the mouse button, the picture starts when you release the button). You can take up to 7 screen pictures. Load with MacPaint and edit them. Then save with a title. Be sure to trash or rename the screen icons when finished with them (i.e., Screen 1, Screen 2, etc...).

Unfortunately it only provides the folder in which the file resides. If that folder is in a folder itself or a hierarchy of folders, you have no way of finding that information as the utility does not allow searching for folders. The author will provide a desk accessory version to users who register. After you're all done, use PackIt II to combine and condense your old applications and files. Those of you with hard disks will appreciate ARCHIVER checking your files and just backing up the ones that you have been using.

Games

MacLuff is a super Tic-Tac-Toe where you try to get 5 crosses in a row on a 30-by-18 grid rather than the usual 3 by 3. It comes from the Royal Institute of Technology in Sweden! External RAM Disk Announced

estern Automation (Boulder, CO) has recently announced a 512K-2 MB EXTERNAL RAM Disk.

The unit is called Disk Acceleration/-Storage Control Hardware (DASCH). DASCH plugs into either the printer port or the modem port, and is completely self-contained (including power supply), so there's no chance of interfering with the Mac's warranty. Total power consumption is about 5 Watts. With such low power, the DASCH may be left on indefinitely; data stored in its RAM remains valid even if the Mac is shut off.

The most surprising thing in my opinion is that it took this long for a manufacturer to come up with this product—it makes so much sense! Imagine having the raw power of one of those "Monster Macs" but without the hassle of modifying your Mac's innards. And the prices are competitive. I spoke with Bob Cone, the product manager, and he provided us with the following info about the different configurations:

512K	64-64K RAM chips	\$495
1 Meg	32-256K RAM chips	\$795
2 Meg	64-256K RAM chips	\$1295

I was personally a little disappointed at the steep price increment as memory goes up, particularly since you can pick up a full Megabyte of memory for under ninety bucks using 256K RAM An adventurer may consider buying the 512K version and replacing all the 64K RAMs with 256K RAMs, giving a 2 Megabyte RAM disk for a total cost of about \$700!! (Contrary to some rumors, 256K RAMs use NO MORE POWER than 64K RAMs.) Unfortunately, however, the RAMs are NOT socketed, so the home upgrade would be even MORE tedious than the Mac 128K to 512K home upgrade (twice as many They also use a four layer chips). printed circuit board.

isn't all that difficult to do; it's just not something that most of us want to bother with.

The documentation needs to be rewritten. Although the process of saving text files from AppleWorks or another word processor is crucial to successful operation of the program, this is not even mentioned until you get to Furthermore, the appendix. documentation assumes that you have all of the time and patience in the world. There is a very vague discussion of character size ("Platen width, page length, print direction, printer density, dots between characters, and dots between lines all have an effect on the resulting size of the characters that will be printed. Also, important, is the size of the font you are using"). It concludes with this: "Play around with some different settings and you'll understand all of this much better." Since your copy doesn't appear on the screen, you won't know what it will look like until you print it, and you end up wasting a lot of paper. It would be nice if they gave recommended formats for the various type styles. You could play around with different settings after you had retired with the proceeds of your best-selling novel.

If they could polish it up and make it easier to use, it would rate high because of the beautiful type faces. As it is, I'd say D+ at most.

Printer Interlocks

Did You Know?

ost printers have a cover interlock switch (for safety) located somewhere on the printer cover. This stops printing if the cover is lifted, while printing. On some printers there is a small cover you can lift to get a view to what is printing without engaging the safety interlock, but if you lift the main cover the printing will stop. You will have to replace the cover and press the select switch to get on-line again.

CAUTION: On some printers the safety interlock switch is activated by a MAGNET which is located somewhere on the cover! If you have such a printer, you should find where the magnet is on the cover and mark it as a reminder to never lay a diskette on the printer cover. To lay a diskette on the cover near the magnet could result in damage to the information or program on the disk.



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
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
