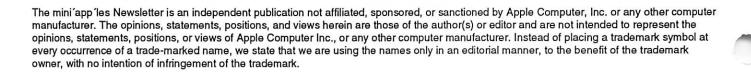

From SmallDog TechTails #133, Sept 23, 2002 Copy-Protected CDs

I have had several people write to me lately complaining about not being able to import certain music CDs with iTunes. Worse yet, these CDs occasionally get stuck in a drive and will neither mount or eject. On some systems, the machine will hang, and you cannot start up with the CD in the drive! These CDs are called "copy-protected" by the manufacturers. For those of us who rely on a computer as a music source, they can be "use-protected" as well!

Here's what's going on:

The data on an audio CD is just that: raw data. It is not structured like a file system, with a directory that contains information about the contents of the disk. An audio CD has just one file which is a continuous stream of information. This is so that CD players don't have to be very smart to read the data. In order for a player or drive to detect the number and lengths of the tracks of a CD, it must scan through the audio portion of the disk, checking where each track begins and ends. Kind of a laborious process, but I guess being able to make a CD player without a microcontroller is worth the few seconds we must wait for a CD player to scan a disk.

Enhanced music CDs put additional information at the end of the audio track. They are essentially partitioned into two volumes. This is why they show up on your desktop as two separate items. (Ever drag a CD to the trash, and had it disappear but not eject? It might be an enhanced audio CD. Try looking for the other mounted volume.) While this is great marketing materiel for bands, even some computer games are published using this format. This is so you can listen to the soundtrack of the game in your car CD player and pretend you are flying an X-Wing instead of a '83 Oldsmobile. But I digress.

In order for a computer to recognize an enhanced CD, it must scan the entire disk and search for more data following the audio track. It must do this with every audio CD that's inserted, since there is no other way to distinguish between an audio CD and an enhanced CD. Usually, the drive finds nothing there. Sometimes, the drive finds data in a generic sort of file system that many computers can understand. Then you can watch you favorite band cavort on the tour bus with their Handy-Cam. And then sometimes...when you least expect it, you find a dirty trick.

Copy-protected CDs are not actually CDs, since they violate the standards set forth by the industry. Their first part is a standard audio track, one huge file of raw data. This is all a normal audio CCD player can see, so they play the CD without a second glance and stop at the end of the audio track. A smarter CD mechanism, like the CD-ROM drive found in a computer (any computer, running any operating system), a smart consumer DVD player, or a professionalgrade CD player will continue past the end of the CD and search for more data. This is where the trap lies.

There is no data at the end of the CD. but there are two sets of instructions. The first tells the drive to look for more data in the second part. The second part tells the drive to go find more data in the first part. Sony just handed your CD drive one of those little cards that says "Turn me over!" on the front and "Look on the other side!" on the back. Unfortunately, CD drives are too stupid to laugh at this first-grade joke and so they flip the card back and forth endlessly, while telling the computer, "Hang on, I have more data for you, just gimme a second..." Thus, your computer might even hang or fail to boot with one of these CDs inserted. At the least, your computer won't eject the disk because it's in use.

Here's what to do:

If you have a copy-protected CD stuck in your computer, try restarting and holding down on the mouse button. This should cause the computer to

http://www.co.dakota.mn.us/library/ locations/burnhaven.htm eject the disk. In some cases, a manual eject may be necessary, by poking a paper clip into a small hole in the CD drive. OS X is smart enough to be able to eject these disks via iTunes or DVD Player, so you could boot holding the "x" key if you have OS X installed but are booting to OS 9. My favorite is to restart and hold Command-Option-O-F at startup. In open firmware, type "eject cd" and that'll take care of it!

Due to successful lobbying by CD manufacturers and computer companies (including Apple), Sony is no longer able to put the CD logo on disks that contain this copy-protection scheme. Instead, they must clearly state that disk is incompatible with computers. I urge you to look closely at each CD you intend to purchase and make sure that it has the CD logo. If the logo isn't there, but you really must listen to the artist's work, download it from LimeWire and send the artist a couple bucks in the mail. That'll be one hundred times what they'd get from the record company anyway.

5. Tips for Ten: Capture That Window

With Mac OS X v10.2, you now have an additional option for capturing screen shots.

 Type Command-Shift-3 to take a screen shot of your entire screen.
Type Command-Shift-4 and Mac OS X will present you with crosshairs you can use to select whatever portion of your display you'd like to capture in a screen shot. And here's the new option:

3. Immediately hit the spacebar after typing Command-Shift-4. Instead of crosshairs, you'll see a little a camera. Move the camera around to highlight the Dock, the menu bar, the desktop, or any open window. Then just click the mouse to "snap" a screen shot. In fact, with this option, you can entirely eliminate the desktop when you capture a screen shot of an individual window.

6. iTunes Tip: Move That Column

You probably already know that you can tell iTunes to sort the music you're browsing simply by clicking one of the column heads. For example, if you click Song Name, iTunes lists the songs you're browsing in alphabetical order. (Click the triangle to change to reverse alphabetical order.) Want to sort your tunes by playing time? Click the Time column. But that's not the only trick you can play with column headers. Did you know that you can easily change the order of the columns? It's true. Say you want the Artist column to appear immediately after the Song Name column. Position the mouse over the Artist column, hold down the mouse button, and drag the column to its new position. The change will apply only to the iTunes window you're browsing.
