May 2006 Editorial

Good News-Bad News: Mac does Windows. Apple announced that there is a program available called Boot Camp. What with the Intel chips, I suppose it was just a matter of time before Windows would be a usable operating system on the Mac. Not that it's a new (gasp!) concept. There have been several programs, SoftWindows, Virtual PC, etc. for various versions of the Windows OS (3.1, 3.11, 95, 98, ME, 2000, etc.) that provided Windows support on the Mac platform. From my experience (SoftWindows 3.1 and 3.11) these programs were slow and problematical. It was easier to just work on a Mac or on a PC. Microsoft Office was the standard and ran on both platforms and the two behaved pretty much the same on both platforms.

There was also a DOS Compatible PDS card for the 6100/66 PowerPC that supported Windows via hardware. The PowerPC 6100/66 DOS Compatible was introduced in January 1995 and discontinued May 1996. The 6100 DOS compatible card included a 66 MHz 486DX2 CPU, SVGA output, and a single SIMM slot

supporting up to 32 MB RAM. The DOS card could share RAM with the Macintosh, or use its own memory. (The DOS Compatibility Card could be added to any 6100 with a free PDS slot.) Several of these computers were purchased where I worked as it was supposed to be a PC environment, but a number of the engineers continued to use Macs as the IT folks couldn't distinguish what was and wasn't a PC via the network. The nice part of the DOS Mac was you could change back and forth between the two operating systems with a keyboard command. The engineers wanted Macs because they were easy to use and network and users could take care of the computers by themselves. The PCs required an extensive IT support network. As Microsoft Office was the standard for all documents and since it was cross platform, IT never knew what kind of a computer a document came from. The DOS Macs were never widespread, but served a useful purpose if there was a Windows specific program that needed to be run. They would hardly cut it in today's computer environment as they were actually pretty slow. I know, I had a 6100/66 and had to put a 266-MHz accelerator card in it to use anything

above Word 5.1. (Photoshop 5.0 needed the accelerator as well.)

Recently the Saint Paul Newspaper had an article (6 April 2006) about the Boot Camp beta test download available on-line from Apple. Apple's shareholders are happy about this as it is seen as an opportunity for the Mac to make inroads into the Windows arena. I did an Internet search for Windows on Macs and found a bunch of stuff. Microsoft had their Virtual PC program (Put a Little PC in Your Mac) that is supposed to expand the power of your Mac. The application supposedly makes it possible for you to access PC-only software, files, networks and devices from your Mac. Virtual PC 7, and according to Microsoft is compatible with the Mac G5 and offers important improvements in support, speed and reliabili-

We'll just have to see if the Apple implementation is any better than Microsoft's or Insignia Solution's.





We're Not In Kansas Anymore, Toto

It's pretty amazing how quickly an unprotected PC running Windows can become compromised when connected to the Internet-an average of 16 minutes, at last count. For many years now, Mac users (myself included) have been touting the virtues of OS X as an operating system that was free of the viruses, spyware, and other assorted malware that plague unfortunate Windows boxen.

Mac OS X is, in many ways, inherently more secure than Windows XP from the ground up. And many security experts have propagated the myth of "security through obscurity" -i.e., the reason there are no virii for OS X is due to its relatively small market share, making it an unattractive target for virus writers. These two factors have given some Mac users a false sense of security, by convincing them that the operating system is, essentially, invincible.

All that changed on February 16, 2006, when the first so-called virus for OS X was discovered in the wild (actively spreading and infecting computers). Strictly speaking, a piece of malware isn't really a virus, so a few words of explanation regarding terminology are due here:

A true virus is any chunk of computer code that attaches itself to an application (the host) and, once activated, propagates by making copies of itself. Much like a biological virus, a computer virus can't spread without a host application to infect. The term virus has come to be used generically to indicate any kind of malware, regardless of whether it meets the definition above.

A worm, on the other hand, is malware that does not require a host program in order to replicate. Worms usually attack some deep-level components of an operating system and spread across networks (both local and the Internet).

Finally, a Trojan (from the classic horse) is malware that is disguised as an innocuous file, and requires the user to run it. Once run, most Trojans create a "back door" point of entry into the computer system which can then be exploited. Although Trojans do not replicate like viruses and worms, they are often used as a carrier for both.

There's some debate about whether the OS X malware (officially named OSX/Leap-A) is actually a worm or a Trojan. Leap-A makes its appearance as a file called "latestpics.tgz" on iChat, and disguises itself as a JPEG file when the unsuspecting user downloads and uncompresses it by double-clicking. Once unleashed, it spreads by forwarding itself to contacts on the infected user's iChat buddy list. This scenario is very familiar to most PC users who use the mail program Outlook, as it's the primary mechanism by which scores of Windows worms spread by infecting the address book. Thus, Leap-A has been officially classified as a worm.

As malware goes, Leap-A is relatively benign: it's rated low on all three counts by Symantec's threat assessment criteria (number detected in the wild, damage, and distribution mechanism). It won't erase your hard drive, crash your Mac, or blow it up. Still, the most significant thing about Leap-A is perhaps the fact that it exists at all: the first giant step in Mac malware authoring has been taken, and more will inevitably follow.

So, what do we do to protect our Macs? The same things we should have been doing all along: staying current with OSX software updates. (see following article) using standard security practices like firewalls, (both hardware and software), and not opening any unfamiliar attachments. At this point, most commercial antivirus packages (especially Norton Antivirus) tend to cause more problems than they solve. Due to the fact that these programs are constantly monitoring files and running in the background, they tend to cause system slowdowns, instability, and application conflicts, behaving, in other words, much like viruses themselves. One exception to the rule is the excellent open-source (free) package called ClamX Antivirus (www.markallan.co.uk/clamXav), which offers background scanning and identification of viruses (but not removal). If you're concerned about an influx of viruses on your Mac, and you're willing to sacrifice some performance and stability, by all means go with a commercial product. However,

There's no reason for widespread panic, and owning a Mac still offers many security-related advantages over a Windows PC. However, no operating system is invincible, and if Leap-A can help raise awareness of good security practices, it may have done the Mac community a significant service after all.

I'd recommend giving ClamX a try

first.
