September Mini'app'les Meeting

At the September Mini'app'les meeting, Mike Bradshaw (ciderconsulting.com) talked about how to ask a question, a good question, on <u>AskDifferent.com</u>. AskDifferent, a <u>StackExchange</u> website, is a community of users that help each other on Mac related topics. StackExchange has been around for 5 years and is described as "a fast-growing network of 106 question and answer sites on diverse topics from software programming to cooking to photography and gaming. We build libraries of high-quality questions and answers, focused on the most important topics in each area of expertise."

Mike described how to ask a good question. *Research the topic first.* Are you showing that you have made an effort to answer the question yourself or are you trying to get someone else to do the basic work for you. *Be on topic.* Obviously AskDifferent is about Mac related items, not about opinions or open-ended discussions. *Be specific.* Asking a vague question, "why is my laptop making a funny noise?" will probably get a vague answer or no answer at all. Providing detail and specifics will give more information for someone to be able to give a good answer.

When asking a question on AskDifferent.com, like all the StackExchange sites, you can post it anonymously. You do need to provide an email, but no other information is required. You can also create an account which allows you to receive ratings, badges for accomplishments (such as providing an answer that others like), and additional privileges.

Mike was asked why someone would want to ask a question on AskDifferent instead of other forums such as Apple's own support forum. He responded to try both and see which one you like better. He pointed out that AskDifferent has some advantages like user editing (someone can add or clarify a question), broader topics (jailbreaking is discussed, but not allowed on Apple's forums), and a ranking system that allows good answers that others agree with to be easier to find.

At the meeting, I also covered a few club business related items. First, the Mini'app'les meeting will be continue for at least the next six months. We are combining the OS X SIG, the iOS SIG, and the Q&A SIG together and meeting on a single night. We will be covering both OS X and iOS topics. I also mentioned the voting for the bylaws was still ongoing and members can vote till September 28th. We also looked at a few things to do in preparing for iOS 7. First, back up your iOS device. There are two options, backing up to iCloud or backup up to your computer through iTunes. If you backup to iCloud, make sure that iCloud is set up in Settings. In the iCloud settings, at the bottom, there is "Storage & Backup". Tapping on that, brings the option to turn iCloud Backup on. It backs up your camera roll, accounts, documents, and settings when the iOS device is plugged in and connected to Wi-Fi. If you backup to your computer, first

make sure that your computer is authorized for your account and you are logged into your iTunes account. If you have purchased anything with your computer with your account, then you are all set. Once you have plugged in your iOS device, if there are any purchases on your device that are not on your computer, iTunes will alert that you can transfer those purchases to the computer. I suggest you do that. Once that is complete, you can start the backup. If your device is selected in the sidebar, there is a backup button in the middle of the screen or you can go to File on the menu bar, go to "Devices" in the drop down menu, and click on "Back Up". At the top of the iTunes window, you will see the progress bar showing the backup process. Once that is done, your iOS device is backed up.

WIth the coming of iOS 7, many apps are being updated to either fix compatibility issues or to change the look of the app to reflect the new look of iOS 7. I would recommend updating your apps so there are fewer problems after you install iOS 7.

The next Mini'app'les meeting will be on October 15th, the third Tuesday of the month, at the <u>Hackfactory</u>. At 6:30 p.m., members of the board and other knowledgable people will be available if you have specific questions you would like answered. We will do our best to address your question and help you troubleshoot the issue.

At 7:00 p.m., we will look at some helpful tips for using iOS 7. We will show you how to make iOS 7 a little easier to read, new things Siri can do, blocking text messages, and other things that will make using iOS 7 more enjoyable. We will also have a few people with the new iPhone 5s and their thoughts on using it. We will have Q&A time at the end.

A Few Interesting Articles

• Apple's "Skankphone" Was The iPhone's Ugly Twin Brother by Austin Carr

Before Apple introduced its polished phone to the world, it was a clunky tablet-size device running intentionally ugly software called skankphone.

When Apple's engineers first began developing the iPhone, it was far from the slim, polished device that it is today. In fact, it didn't resemble a phone at all. "It was a tablet-size device, with this thick cable running into a Mac," recalls Nitin Ganatra, Apple's former director of engineering for iOS applications. "Shoved into the corner of this display was the phone interface."

• BlackBerry's decline illustrated in a single chart by Zach Epstein

A picture is worth a thousand words, but sometimes a chart can be even more valuable. As a new chapter in the book of BlackBerry begins to unfold with a possible buyout looming, The Washington Post republished a comScore chart that does a great job of illustrating BlackBerry's rise to dominance in the U.S. smartphone market. It also shows us how unbelievably quickly the company's U.S. market share evaporated as Android and iOS grew to take over the country.

• 5s [Apple's attention to detail] by Dustin Curtis

The iPhone 5s is a minor update to the iPhone, but it feels surprisingly significant after just a couple of days of use. The speed increase of the A7 is far more important than I had expected; the camera, interface effects, and overall experience are dramatically improved because of the increased speed. Below are some of my initial thoughts and observations about minor details of the 5s update that I haven't seen explicitly mentioned elsewhere. Some of the points below relate only to the Space Gray iPhone 5s, and all of my experience is in comparison to a black iPhone 5.

For the first two points to make sense, you should know that the new home button has two parts: the inner area, which is where the touch ID sensor is, and then an outer area which is a small chamfered metal border that connects the inner area of the button with the external case. You can see the structure here.

The outer part of the new home button is exactly the same size as the Phone app and passcode keypad number circles in iOS 7, which are in turn also identical in size to the holes in the back of the new iPhone 5c rubber case.

• Is AppleCare worth it? by Jonathan Seff

When you buy an Apple hardware product such as a Mac or an iPad, you get a one-year hardware warranty and 90 days of free phone-based tech support, starting from the date of purchase. If something goes wrong other than, say, you dropping your MacBook Air in a bucket of soapy water—Apple generally picks up the tab for repairing or replacing your hardware (at its discretion). As most of us know, however, things tend to go south with hardware sometime after the included warranty expires. Often, it seems to happen the very next day. Let's call it Klutzy's Law. To ensure that your spiffy purchase continues to work without requiring you to pay for repairs and support as the need arises, Apple offers AppleCare Protection Plans as add-on purchases. But what do they give you? How much do they cost? And most importantly, are they worth it?

• Apple offering 'last compatible version' of iOS apps for older hardware by Matt Brian

With iOS 7 arriving tomorrow, Apple is extending some love to the owners of older iOS devices that have been left behind. New compatibility features, first spotted on Reddit, will now kick into action if you attempt to download an app that is not supported by your current firmware. Instead, the company now asks if you'd like to install the last compatible version, which, for some apps, can be over a year old. We've successfully installed an older version of Instagram to an iPhone 3GS with iOS 4.3.3 and Twitter to an iPhone 3G running iOS 4.2.1. Although Instagram was "out of date," the last compatible version of Twitter (featured above) was version 4.3.2, and hit the App Store back on August 18th, 2012. If you're feeling nostalgic and you've got an aging iPhone, iPad or iPod touch that could use a bit of exercise, Apple's latest tweak might teach your old device some new tricks.
